

Planet Youth

Castlerea Community School is proud to serve on the Steering Committee of the Planet Youth initiative. Planet Youth is an international evidence-based primary prevention model that has been developed in order to reduce substance use rates amongst adolescents.

It works by directly targeting the risk and protective factors in young people's lives that determine their substance use behaviours and enhancing the social environment they are growing up in. By reducing the known risk factors and strengthening the known protective factors the problems associated with adolescent substance use can be reduced or stopped before they arise. The Planet Youth model offers the opportunity to improve the long-term health and life outcomes for young people and goes far beyond simply reducing their substance use rates.



The model is underpinned by the data derived from the administration of the Planet Youth questionnaire. This comprehensive lifestyle questionnaire was administered to the 15-16 year olds in the target community and it examines a great many aspects of their lives. There were questions on their substance use, health, mental health, physical activity, family and school experience, internet use, bullying and so on. For more information visit www.planetyouth.ie
